Celebrating the Land of Promise on its 250 Birthday

When Abraham and Sarah leave Ur-Casdim and head for the land God will show them, God makes a promise, "I will assign this land to your offspring." (Gen. 12:7) God's covenant with Abraham and Sarah would be passed down to Isaac and Rebecca, to Jacob, Leah, and Rachel and eventually to their descendants the Children of Israel. This is how we get the concept of "The Promised Land." The land of Israel would become the epicenter for our Hebrew language, culture, religious faith, and national aspirations, heartbreaking exile, and miraculous return. For thousands of years our people sought to once again be able to determine our destiny and live freely in the Promised Land. "Proclaim liberty throughout the land to all of its inhabitants..." (Lev. 25:10) And despite the current struggles and heartache we find ourselves in - Israel remains our land of Hope.

But, if Israel is the Promised Land then we have also been blessed by another land - a land I believe is the "Land of Promise." - the United States. Unlike most countries founded on religious and/or ethnic identity, the United States was founded on ideas - "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness" (Declaration of Independence) These ideas would become the promise of a land of liberty, opportunity, and equality which immigrants from all over the world would dream about. Breaking free from the shackles of monarchy and subjugation, state and church sponsored pogroms, limited economic freedom, and the virulent antisemitism that kept us in Pales of Settlement, ghettos, and disempowered. And so wave upon wave of Jewish (and of course non-Jewish) immigration would transform this country bringing new ideas, hard working laborers, a melting pot of innovative artists, scientists, and entrepreneurs in search of the promise of America.

Since its founding there was always a tension between the promise of America and the reality of America. From the evils of slavery, destruction of Native Americans, lack of women's rights, antisemitism, anti-immigrant backlash and the gap between the wealthy and the poor - there is a lot that we must reckon with. Dr. King termed it a "promissory note" that has gone unpaid. Yet, despite its many flaws and failings, for Jews seeking a place where we could flourish and live in relative peace - in our long history there has never been quite a country like America. From the freedom of religion, speech, and assembly to the profound opportunity of citizenship, voting, representation, and equality under the law - Jews had never experienced a place where we could, as a small minority, literally help to build the country from its founding and become part of the very fabric of the Goldena Medina itself. We have not only prospered beyond imagination but contributed to the promise of America.

America is more than an "experiment" but a project that is worth investing in, fighting for, and dreaming about together. Far from perfect, this country needs "We the People..." and we Jews are an important part of that "We". While only 2% of the population, we have contributed greatly to: Nobel Prize winners, Broadway, the movies & tv, musicians, fashion and beauty, shopping, literature, economics, technology, politics and civil rights, and military service - the American Jewish community has been a blessing to America and America has been a blessing to us. I believe we should thank God for being alive in a time where we as Jews can help build the Promised Land and the Land of Promise. There is no guarantee for their continued prosperity and freedom but instead a sacred responsibility for each of us to add our labor, talents, and resources to see the project of Israel & America move closer to the ideals and promise each possess and upon which we as Jews depend.

May God bless America! Happy 250th Birthday!

COMMITTEE CORNER

HOUSE COMMITTEE

- Awaiting contractor's estimate to repair or replace a damaged structural beam on sanctuary South wall.
- Reprogrammed Sanctuary LED lights to 80% in order to prolong life of the units.
- Roof drains cleaned by in-house personnel.
- Contractor inspected and provided estimate for raised concrete slab in walkway between North parking lot and courtyard. Work to be scheduled.
- In-house personnel removed protruding rebar in handicap parking area near Menorah.

SECURITY COMMITTEE

- Contractor for Bollards has been paid. Awaiting reimbursement from State grant.
- A citation warning was issued by Colonial Regional Police for a false alarm. This was caused by an error by Altronics. The issue has been corrected.
- High Holidays: A sign-up list is being prepared that will be sent to all members asking for volunteers to man the doors and check tickets during the High Holidays.

FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE

- **June 5 Dinner:** Shabbat dinner June 5 honoring all who have made kiddush and food events was held. Commitments to contribute to kiddushes led to commitments of about \$13,000. Over 70 people attended, and 38 out of 52 Shabbatot in the coming fiscal year have at least one contributor.
- **Plaques:** The new plaque for the Dancing Rabbi sculpture is completed and shipped. Menorah plaques have been ordered.
- Letters are being prepared for ads for Annual Bulletin. Ed and Jannie Kay are this year's honorees.

CEMETERY COMMITTEE

- **Water Leak:** A repair for a leaky pipe at the Handwashing Station estimated at \$10,000-11,000.
- **Spring Cleanup:** Ongoing maintenance and cleanups have taken place
- **Power Washing:** Monuments are in need of power washing/cleaning at a Cost of \$25 per Monument, 250 Monuments.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

- Completed walkthrough with MIB for facilities valuation & final report received.
- Reviewed content updates for website with Rabbi, updated bios and photos
- Reviewed vacation policy with employees and reviewed staff roles and responsibilities
- Created a draft "Donate" page on our website
- Began application for new corporate credit card

- **Starry Shabbatot:** Scheduled for May 29, June 19, July 31, and August 28.
- Shavuot learning was led by both Rabbi Singer and Rabbi Nathan for a thought-provoking discussion of wartime ethics.
- We will have a semi-quincentennial Shabbat on July 4. Congregants will receive flags (in advance) to fill in their American Dream.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

- The finance committee has 2 new members: Ed Kay and Paul Kottler
- The committee's current priorities: Revise Chart of Accounts to match the committee-led annual budget for the coming fiscal year; Revisit the membership dues structure; Form a subcommittee to define and document policies.

AD-HOC KIDDUSH COMMITTEE

- Worked with the Sunshines to come up with a proposal for the Kiddushim for the next fiscal year.
- In Progress of preparing contract with Sunshines.
- There will be a 6 week rotational schedule of 3 Hot Kiddushim, 2 cold Kiddushim and 1 Congregant provided Kiddush.

- **The Holocaust Memorial Stone:** The date for the unveiling and the pre-holy days visitation to our Cemetery is Sunday September 6, 2026. It will be followed by a light lunch and Holocaust presentation, "Marcel Tesse: A Child Holocaust Survivor."

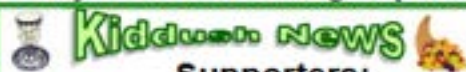

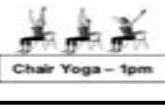
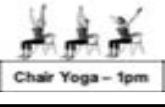
